Finally to every Board Member who went above and beyond their usual call of duty to perform tasks that helped their neighbours during this challenging time. You know who you are and you are amazing!




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

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Flood 2013 packed a strong punch but did not knock out this resilient community

As I write this, the impacts of Flood 2013 are still with us. Many people are still out of their homes and some will not be able to return for six months or more. The flood came fast and with incredible force. The community was wounded as a whole and some residents suffered significantly. Our hearts go out to them in these very challenging times.

During the peak flood and clean up period, I sent out a series of e-mails to our members letting them know what we had learned about what was going on. When I sent out the first e-mail on June 20, I and most resident had no idea what was coming. I found that information specific to this community was hard to come by and I had to talk to many people before I got a sense of what was going on. Our residents were of course frustrated with this situation. During my travels around the community, I was able to observe what was going on and in my talks to people throughout the community, I learned more than some of the official relief people knew. So I attempted to communicate what I found out as frequently as I could. I got many e-mails thanking me for doing this.

One of the more frustrating situations stemmed from the power outage. There were residents that were not in the flooded area who had no power for many days and they felt they should have power. The problem is that the transformers in our community are all below ground and many had been flooded or were wet. Some had to be pumped out many times as the water seeped back into them. I think this situation should be reviewed and over time changes made to prevent this problem.

What struck me in my tours of the community was how many people within and beyond the community rolled up their sleeves and helped others in the severely impacted areas. I personally got many inquiries about how I was doing and offering shelter. Some of these people were part of the volunteers who came to help people they did not even know but they knew the people needed help. We thank all of the volunteers for helping and I am sure our residents impacted by the flood really appreciated the help.



The community centre served as a re-entry centre and then as a flood support centre from Sunday, June 23 to Thursday, July 4. It was a hub of activity for both emergency personnel and for volunteers and of course those needing help as a result of the flood. There was a lot of residual dust from the mud brought in on rubber boots but we were pleased to help in this small way.

We had many donations of food and goods for the volunteers and for those people that were displaced by the flood. We would like to thank each and every person, group and business who made these donations. The residual supplies went to High River and left over packaged food went to the Food Bank.

While there are so many people to thank who helped during this trying period, there is one individual who went above and beyond anyone else that I am aware of. That is Patrick Arnel, our Environment Director. He did some amazing things without any fanfare. He set up some tables in the hardest hit areas and got donations of food, drinks and other supplies for the volunteers helping in those areas. He helped with the actual clean up for days. He got generators to help people have power for what they needed power for. He got a large generator for the community centre. The list goes on and on and I want to recognize his efforts in helping others in this community.

This story is not completed and it will take many months for the mud and dust to settle. However, the residents of this community have proved they are very resilient.

Alberta Health Services EMS

Accidental poisoning

Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and caregivers of children of precautions they can take to prevent childhood poisonings. Ingesting medications, prescription or over-the-counter, is the leading cause of accidental poisoning in children. Even small amounts of adult medications can be seriously harmful or even fatal to your child if swallowed. Other causes of poisoning are household products, such as dishwasher tablets, and personal care items, such as mouthwash or nail polish.

Medication storage

- Store all medications in a locked container and place in an area inaccessible to children.
- Keep medications in their original child-resistant packaging.
- Do not mix multiple medications inside one bottle.
- Install child locks on all cabinets or drawers where medications are stored.

Prevention

- Store household products, car supplies, and cosmetics in locked cupboards or drawers.
- Apply child safety latches to drawers and cabinets if they are within a child's reach.
- Know and label all plants in and around your home and garden.
- Antifreeze, windshield washer fluid, and pesticides are extremely poisonous. Even small amounts of these can cause serious illness when ingested.
- Poisoning information can be obtained by calling the Poison and Drug Information Service (PADIS) at: 1-800-332-1414.

In case of a poisoning emergency, call 9-1-1.

Provide the name of the product ingested or, if it is safe to do so, a sample of the substance for EMS to inspect on their arrival.

Safety tips

- Ensure visitors to your home keep their personal belongings out of children's reach. They may contain unsafe items.
- Take extra precautions with medicines that appeal to children such as chewable vitamins or flavored cough and cold syrups.
- Properly dispose of any medications or toxic household products no longer in use.





CALGARY WILDLIFE





The recent flooding in Southern Alberta has had visible and devastating effects on homes, businesses, and the landscape, but its effects have also reached other aspects of our beautiful province that are not as easy to see: Our wildlife. The surge of water has damaged wild habitats, orphaned newborn young, and caused various injuries to other wild animals.

The flooding has had a wide-spread effect on our environment and wild-life. Birds have been knocked from their nests, fawns have been found struggling in the high waters, beavers have had their dams and lodges destroyed, and many other species have been displaced or injured. We have seen Albertans showing their love for

their province throughout this disaster by volunteering their time to help clean the streets and homes of their human neighbours, but they have also shown their support by helping to rescue the wildlife in our area.

By calling the Calgary Wildlife Rehabilitation Society (CWRS) Albertans have helped to save the lives of many flood affected animals. The CWRS' dedicated volunteers have tirelessly rounded up the animals in need and brought them to the centre, where they have been given medical attention, housing, and food.

The wildlife recently received by the CWRS includes ducklings, goslings, fawns, and beavers. Many of the rescued animals will require long-term

care, which can be a strain on the charity's already limited resources; the organization relies solely on grants, fundraising, and private donations. The beavers, for example, will remain at the CWRS for one to two years before they are ready to be released, and the fawns will need daily care until about October.

The CWRS centre was not spared damage during this summer deluge. Their waterfowl pen, where they rehabilitate local species of aquatic birds was badly damaged in the heavy rain and is no longer useable. Albertans have already shown so much generosity to the CWRS, but the need is still greater than ever.





Responsible Pet Ownership in Parks

With the arrival of summer, dog owners look forward to being outside and enjoying time with their family, friends and pets. Knowing and adhering to the regulations laid out in the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw 23M2006 helps to ensure that dogs are not being a nuisance in the community and dogs and citizens are safe.

Animal & Bylaw Services would like to remind dog owners of the following:

- When off of their owner's property, dogs must be on a leash unless in a designated off-leash area.
- When in designated off-leash areas, dog owners must ensure their dog is under control, is within their sight and responds to commands.
- Parking lots adjacent to off-leash areas are on leash.
- Dogs must be walked on the right hand side of the pathway on a leash that is no more than two metres in length and must not interfere with other pathway users.
- Owners cannot cycle, in-line skate or skateboard on a pathway with a leashed dog.
- Dogs are not allowed in school grounds, playgrounds, sport fields, golf courses, cemeteries, wading and swimming areas, and other areas prohibited by signs.
- Dogs must not enter or swim in any body of water within a park except a river that runs through, or is adjacent to, a City park.
- Owners are responsible for picking up all waste produced by their dog.

When we respect the bylaw we contribute to a safer and healthier community.
